Re: Disclosure of Personally Identifiable Information

Dear Mr. Karberg:

I write on behalf of Allegis Group, Inc. (“Company”) regarding a data security incident that may have exposed the personal information of 33 Maryland residents.

The Company contracts with Talx Corporation (“Talx”), a wholly owned subsidiary of Equifax Inc., to provide certain payroll-related services. The Company employees are able to access these payroll services through Talx’s online portal. On February 1, 2017, the Company and Equifax discovered that an unknown individual or individuals had reset the PIN to several Company employee accounts and then accessed those accounts without authorization. The Company and Talx promptly took steps to understand what happened, and concluded on February 22, 2017 that a total of 44 Company employee accounts may have been accessed without authorization, including the accounts of 33 Maryland residents. The personal information that was accessed may have included electronic copies of 2016 W-2 tax forms, names, addresses, employee identification numbers, social security numbers, financial information, and other employment related information.

Talx is coordinating implementation of additional security measures with the Company to help prevent recurrence of this type of incident. Talx and the Company have also reported this incident to federal law enforcement. To date, neither Talx nor the Company are aware of any other employee accounts that are affected.

On March 3, 2017, on our behalf, Talx notified the 33 Maryland residents by mail. An unaddressed copy of that notification is attached to this letter. The Company had previously provided information about the incident to the affected employees, and offered the employees a free subscription to an Equifax ID Patrol identity theft protection product for two (2) years. This product will provide the employees with comprehensive credit file monitoring and automated alerts of any key changes to their credit reports, as well as \$1 million in Identity Fraud Expense Coverage.

RE: Data Security Incident

Dear _____:

We are writing to tell you about a data security incident involving the unauthorized access to electronic copies of your W-2 tax form. We take the protection and proper use of your information very seriously. For this reason, we are contacting you directly to explain the circumstances of the incident.

What Happened

Your employer, Allegis Group, Inc., has contracted with Talx Corporation (“Talx”), a wholly owned subsidiary of Equifax Inc., to provide payroll-related services that you are able to access through the intranet as well as Talx’s website www.mytaxform.com (“online portal”). A user reset the PIN to access your account through the online portal and then accessed your online account on [date]. Afterward, Talx determined that this PIN reset and account access was unauthorized. Upon learning of the unauthorized access, Talx promptly took steps to understand what happened, and concluded that the unauthorized user was able to reset your PIN and successfully answer personal questions about you. Talx was not the source of any of the information used to reset your PIN and access your account.

What Information Was Involved

The unauthorized individual accessed an electronic copy of your 2016 W-2 tax form.

What We Are Doing

Talx is coordinating implementation of additional security measures with your employer to help prevent recurrence of this type of incident. We also reported this incident to federal law enforcement.

In addition, Talx is offering you two years of ID Patrol identity protection service **at no cost to you**, which your employer has already provided to you by separate communication.

What You Can Do

Because your W-2 tax form was accessed by the unauthorized individual, it is possible that a fraudulent tax return could be filed in your name. Therefore, we strongly recommend that you contact the Internal Revenue Service and your state tax agency as soon as possible to report this incident.

Internal Revenue Service (IRS): You may contact the IRS Identity Protection Specialized Unit at 1-800-908-4490. The IRS may request that you file IRS Form 14039 (which is available at <https://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/f14039.pdf>). Finally, we urge you to enroll in Equifax's ID Patrol identity protection service. Even if you choose not to enroll in Equifax's ID Patrol identity protection service, there are other steps you can take to help protect yourself. Please see the information in the "Identity Theft Prevention Tips" attachment about how you can obtain a free copy of your credit report and place a fraud alert and/or credit freeze on your credit report.
